Personal Pronouns

The first and second persons in Old English were inflected for three numbers (singular/dual/plural), and four cases, but not for gender; this was a category only of the third-person singular. Plural was the same for all genders. The basic Old English system was: (pay attention to the forms which survived to PdE)
