II. COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The aim of the course is:

1. to develop all language skills (reading, listening, speaking and writing) at A2 level;
2. to develop communication skills in typical everyday situations;
3. to introduce basic vocabulary and grammatical structures to communicate in everyday situations;
4. to provide tools for further development of language skills, also in the academic context.

III. COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

A2 level according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages:

SKILLS:

Learning outcomes according to main language skills: listening, reading, speaking, and writing

LISTENING

U_01. identifies phrases and the highest frequency vocabulary related to areas of most immediate personal relevance (place of living, family, work, education, leisure time, health etc) when the speaker speaks slowly and clearly;

U_02. understands the main points in short, simple messages and announcements when the speaker speaks slowly and clearly;

READING

U_01. understands the main message of simple texts related to areas of most immediate personal relevance;

U_02. finds necessary information in simple everyday material, such as advertisements, timetables, or prospectuses;

SPEAKING

U_01. communicates in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange on familiar and routine matters;

U_02. uses a series of phrases and sentences to describe in simple terms their family and other people, living conditions, educational background, work etc;

WRITING

U_01. writes short and simple texts and messages related to typical everyday situations; writes very short letters using expressions related to areas of most important personal relevance;

IV. COURSE DESCRIPTION/COURSE CONTENT:

Grammatical and lexical material as required at the A2 level according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, basic vocabulary connected with a given field of study.

Vocabulary:

1. The alphabet, digits, and numbers
2. Personal data: name, surname, nationality, profession
3. Family
4. Accommodation: rooms in a house, furniture

5. Appearance, character, body parts
6. Everyday life: daily routine, hobby, sport, entertainment, cultural activity
7. The media: press, cinema, the Internet
8. Travel and tourism
9. The weather, climate, seasons
10. Food: gastronomy, meals, shopping, diet

Grammar:

1. Pronouns (personal, demonstrative, contracted, adjective, relative, y, en)
2. Articles (indefinite, definite, partitive)
3. The present tense
4. Possessive adjectives
5. Prepositions
6. The imperative
7. Past tenses: le passé composé, le passé récent
8. Future tenses: le futur proche, le futur simple
9. Comparisons

1. Francophones in the world
2. France and its geography
3. Tourist destinations in France
